The children in Kindergarten and Nursery have been learning their Montessori 'Continents' song. Please practice this song with your children.

#### Elementary

Last week Elementary had a wonderful time at Lloyd Park for a bird watching expedition. They identified many birds in the park, listened to their sounds, learned about some of their migration patterns and got to feed the ducks. Back in class some children completed bird reports by looking in books and computers. Children also went on another 'out and about' session this week to identify and classify invertebrates in the garden. They are learning about the scientific process of classification. Children also completed research on different vertebrates. This week we focused on birds, reptiles and amphibians.

In literacy, the children are looking at mythology and Greek gods and goddesses as well as structure and forms used in poetry.

In maths, the children worked on word challenges, multiplication, long division and dynamic subtraction. This week we will continue to look at Mountain Ranges in Geography, Poetry and Myths.

#### Prep

Last week the children continued working on their creative writing skills using picture prompts. We also reviewed the use of commas in sentences and created a 3-day lunch menu for our book character – Bob - "The Man on The Moon".

In Maths, the children were introduced to bar charts. We looked at how data could be collected and represented in a table using tally marks. The children had a go at creating their own bar chart and were able to answer simple questions relating to their graph.

In Science we watched a short video of how the Earth rotates on its axis to create day and night. Using our Continent Globe and torchlight we rotated the globe and looked at how different parts of the globe were illuminated at different times. The children observed the following: when UK enters light, it is daytime and it is night time in Australia and when it is daytime in Asia, it is night-time in South America. The children then wrote their own explanations on what causes day and night.

The children enjoyed their trip to Lloyd Park albeit the freezing weather. They couldn't wait to get their hands on the binoculars! Some of the birds sighted were

Sparrows, Woodpigeons, Robins, Blue tits, Starlings, Moorhen and a Peregrine.

#### **Reception**

Last week Reception class learned how animals survive in the winter; how they stay warm; where do they get their food. Animals do amazing things to get through the winter! They migrate, hibernate or adapt.

During our morning maths session, we have focused on subtracting to 10. Also shapes and 3D shapes. We worked with letter and sound "y", we searched the sound at the beginning, middle and end of the words. We can build words from letters and groups of letters. We had an exciting Design and Technology lesson. Miss Alex and our teachers helped us to wrap our DT notebook with wrapping paper.

On Thursday morning Reception class had a very exciting bird watching session at Lloyd Park with Vicky. She gave us binoculars and she explained to us how to use them when we were searching for birds. We learned a lot of interesting facts about the birds. During our session we also observed the behaviour of a squirrel and saw its home in the branches of a high tree. Later in class we talked about the parts of a squirrel's body. On Friday we enjoyed our art lesson. We made our favourite animals from paper.

#### Kindergarten:

#### Beech:

Last week Beech class had a very busy week! We started the week with talking about the continent Asia. We looked at three different countries, Russia, China and United Arab Emirates. We learned about their capital cities, the language they speak, their traditional clothing and their food. Furthermore, we tried to use chopsticks to transfer pompoms from one cup to another. It was really funny, and the children enjoyed using the chopsticks. Our Lloyd Park trip was very successful as well. Vicky, the parks Educationalist took us around the park and showed us the birds. The Children were marking down the birds they had seen and trying to learn their names. This week we will continue talking about Asia. We would like to remind you that 'show and tell' happens every Wednesday, please send in something that your child would like to share with the rest of the class.

#### Oak:

Last week was Bird Watching Week in the UK and we commemorated it in Oak class by looking at, listening to and talking about some of the most beautiful birds in our country. During our 'Out and About' session we went in the garden and tried spotting some birds using real binoculars! As a part of this terms topic we looked at two more countries located in the continent of Asia - Russia and





some of the popular sports in Russia and watched a video of an Olympic champion Evgeni Plushenko. After watching Mr Plushenko skate gracefully across the skating rink few of us decided to become ice skaters when we grow up!

The other big country we learnt about last week was China, which is located in Asia. We looked at Traditional Chinese hieroglyphs and learnt how to say "hello" and "goodbye" in Chinese Mandarin language. We also tried to "eat" with chopsticks - which was not easy!

Lastly, we did an amazing experiment with Skittles candy and water, which made a beautiful rainbow on a plate.

#### Sycamore:

Last week the children have been exploring the continent 'Asia' and the countries within.

We looked at Russia closely as this is the largest country in the world and how their climate is different throughout the country. The famous Wassily Kandinsky was a Russian



painter and art theorist. He is credited with painting one of the first recognised purely abstract works. Sycamore class children participated in their very own abstract painting, we used shapes and a ruler to make lines. We were very fortunate that

snow fell overnight, and the children were really excited to explore the outdoors, we looked closely at how the snow settled around our garden. Even though it was really cold

the children held and touched the snow. A few children collected some snow and placed it into a container and they brought it in class. We all monitored how long it would take for the snow to



melt

into liquid. On Thursday the children drew their attention to 'China' and learnt lots of exciting facts such as the traditional 'Hanfu' clothing which is made from silk and how beautiful the fabric is detailed. We all had a go at using chopsticks and tried to pick up strips of cotton wool, there was lots of laughter in class!

This week we will continue to focus on other countries within 'Asia' such as 'Japan' and 'India'. We may even have a surprise from a teacher dressing in a traditional costume. The final two countries we will touch on will be 'Cambodia' and 'Thailand'.

#### Nursery:

Last week, children explored the great artists of the world. They learned various art techniques by making their own interpretations of the worlds famous work of art. The children made Matisse's style collage, Monet's water lilies, created Pollock's style drip painting, drew a portrait like



Picasso and made flowers out of play dough for Frida



Carlo's hair. They were also introduced to the country of origin for each of these artists. For our 'out and about' session, the



children loved listening and observing birds in the garden. We spotted a robin, a black bird, a crow and many pigeons flying above.

This week, the children will have an opportunity to explore world music and folk dances. They will learn about Flamenco and create a clothespin Flamenco dancer, they will step dance to Irish music, learn about Russian music, dance to tango and explore the African folk dance. There will be various art activities, music and dance to support these lessons.
