

Class Information

Reception and Prep

Reception Class and Prep Class have formally merged. We are using both rooms to work and it is lovely to watch the children working collaboratively with each other.

In Maths, the younger children worked with the Golden Beads and Large Decimal Cards. We

worked through several exercises, which enabled them to become more familiar with the different place value categories and quantities. Some of the children were also introduced to addition using the Golden Beads. The older children worked with Time although we did have some younger children joining in. The children worked collaboratively with a partner and challenged them to tell the time to the hour, half past, quarter to and quarter past. Aside from working with time related activities, the children have also been repeating activities relating to fractions.

In Literacy, the younger children have been practicing their letter formations and working hard with the movable alphabets. The older children continued to work with verbs in the present and past continuous tense and we reviewed some of the spelling rules when working with *-ing* endings.

The children were also introduced to the work of French Artist Henri Matisse. During circle time we read a book entitled Matisse's Garden by



Samantha Friedman which showed how the artist's neverending curiosity and continuous process of trying new things helped turn a small



experiment into a new form of art. They enjoyed looking at the beautiful illustrations of some of his famous work and created their own Matisse inspired creations for art.

World Book Day is on Thursday, 7th March. Please have children dress up as their favourite book character and bring in their favourite book!

Elementary

Last week elementary continued learning about features of rivers, as well as researched and drew maps with major rivers in Britain. Some children picked other rivers to learn about in the world. Some chose to learn about the Nile River and others chose to learn about the Amazon. Next, in Literacy, children are creating writing plans for their own myths. Some children have

began to put their plan for their myth in action. They are learning how to use creative story elements in their writing, such as creating a problem, a solution, as well as using creative imagery to describe their characters and setting. We are also working on proper use of speech marks, commas punctuation and editing skills for our stories.

In maths some children are working on prealgebra skills, long multiplication, static and dynamic subtraction, money work, clock work and division skills.

World Book Day in next week on Thursday. Children should come dressed as their favourite character from a book, and bring the book with them to share. Children will be participating in a variety of activities related to their books.

Kindergarten:

Beech:

Oak:

Oak class got back from the half term holiday and got straight into our new continent - the great continent of Africa. We discovered that Africa has many countries in it such as Algeria, Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya, Madagascar, Morocco, Nigeria and many others. We discussed amazing variety of African landscapes which include the greatest desert in the world called Sahara, the longest river in the world called the Nile and breathtaking Victoria falls. We learnt about Egypt and its magnificent pyramids, that were built over 4000 years ago. We looked at different animals found in a safari and we made our own animals

out of playdough, sticks and pipe cleaners during our 'Out and About' session.

On Thursday we joined the rest of the school for the presentation on Morocco - a country in Northern Africa.





We saw, touched and smelled different objects found in

Moroccan culture, such as Moroccan teapot and cups, Moroccan slippers Babouche, Moroccan dress Jalaba, traditional black soap Beldi and beautiful Moroccan lamp. We really enjoyed learning so many different words in another language! On Friday we talked about St. David who is the main saint of Wales. We commemorated St.David's Day by making daffodils using yellow paper, cocktail straws and cupcake liners.



Last week we concentrated on sound "s" and the book of the week was "Superworm" by Julia Donaldson.

Sycamore:

Our continent exploration focussed on Africa this week. We learned about different countries including Egypt and Morocco. There was some amazing discoveries about the Sphinx and the



great pyramids in Egypt and the tallest mountain Mount Kilimanjaro. We wlso looked at Egyptian fashion and made our own Egyptian collars. The Egyptians communicated by

using hieroghyphs, pictorial images. Sycamore class manipulated the playdough to create their own hieroghyphs. Our exploration continued on the country of Morocco. All of Kindergarten joined together to learn about different landmarks and places including the beautiful Atlas mountains. We also tried on traditional Moroccan outfits and learnt about the Souks markets and Moroccan food.

This week we will continue our discussions on Morocco and we have some exciting activities planned including making Moroccan tea light holders.

We are looking forward to Pancake Day on Tuesday where the children will have the opportunity to prepare fruits to accompany their pancakes. week at home, to support their work in school.
