Newsletter Pancake Day

The whole school celebrated Pancake Day last Tuesday. The children learnt that this day signifies the beginning of Lent for Christians and that pancakes were eaten on Shrove Tuesday as a feast before the fasting of Lent commences on Ash Wednesday. The children enjoyed flipping the pancakes and preparing the toppings of fresh fruit. The children enjoyed squeezing their oranges and lemons and slicing the bananas to eat with their

Inside the Montessori Classroom...

The knobbed cylinders are a very effective piece of Montessori equipment. The aims are: to develop an understanding of fine differences in dimension, to introduce grading,



preparation for the decimal system (as all of the cylinders are in sets of 10) To develop fine motor skills, eye-hand coordination and pincer grip for writing.

There are 4 cylinder blocks in the set and each one contains 10 cylinders cut from the solid block. They are introduced to children from 2 years upwards. They continue to be very useful in teaching mathematical concepts up to the age of 6. The block is placed in front of the child and the cylinders are then removed one by one placing them at random in front of the block. Once they are all removed the directress looks carefully at the block and at the empty socket and then looks for the matching cylinder to fit it. This is showing the children how to make a decision about what fits. Eventually the 4 cylinder blocks (which increase in difficulty) can we worked with together to present even greater challenge. As a parent you can support this work by looking for cylinders in the world around you and discussing their properties i.e., rolling, circular faces etc.

Elementary

The children have been learning about 'IL CARNEVALE' in Italian. In Italy the celebration lasts for several days, with costumes and masked parades. The children made their own animal masks in class.



We have been discovering the nature in Epping Forest and The Walthamstow Marshes. We were surprised to learn that the Marshes are home to two of Britain's rarest plants, the Creeping Marshwort and Brookweed; also, the Essex Skipper, a butterfly with a range that is restricted within the London area. The children were amazed that cattle are still grazing on both the Marshes and the Forest.

In Geography, the children have been reviewing the countries that make up the United Kingdom and the bodies of water surrounding it. This has led us to take a closer look at Wales, for the celebration of St. David's Day.

We are looking forward to our visit to The William Morris Gallery this week, where we are sure to learn more about him and how his work was inspired by nature. We will also be focusing upon books throughout the week with a variety of book-related activities.

Reception

The teaching and hands-on learning strategies work to get students using their skills including solving problems, models, representing, reasoning, calculating and communicating.



Knowing the sign for 'add' and for 'subtract', finding the product and the difference are all steps along the path to a way of thinking that seems obvious to adults but is quite advanced for the children Reception children have been immersed in many maths activities that require the mastering of their reasoning skills.

In relation to the topic, Walthamstow, reception class has been discovering the different species of animals, plants and trees that can be found in Walthamstow's forests and parks. Reception children have also been encouraged to write and draw the different facts that we have learnt on their books.



To conclude the week, reception class did some research about St. David's Day, the reason why the Welsh celebrated it on the 1st of March and what the capital of Wales is. At the end of the lesson, we all drew one of the most emblematic symbols of Wales: the daffodil.

Kindergarten:

Beech Class

We enjoyed looking at the frogspawn on the nature table! Our frogspawn are now tadpoles! We have made a little book to show the changes.

Last week we learnt about St David's Day and made daffodils. Each day we have been enjoying sharing our half term diaries. Thank you for making these so enjoyable for everyone. We loved having pancakes at school and we learnt about Shrove Tuesday and similar traditions in other countries. Lots of us tried to write independently.

We were excited to see a bit of snow on Thursday and we cut out paper snowflakes. We have some new activities in our classroom to help us learn about tessellations and patterns.

This week we are looking at different types of books and the job of the author and illustrator.

We will be creating a little library in our class on World Book Day!

Finley worked hard to sequence the large number cards from 1-9000 Children can see the relative difference in sizes in the powers of ten cards. The colour coding helps the child to recognise each category Thousands are in green like



units as they are 'units of thousands' (in the same way tens of thousands would be blue and hundreds of thousands would be red etc)

Children are introduced to these cards after learning the physical quantity using the golden bead material

We are all missing Ela who was very brave having her tonsils removed and we hope she gets better very soon. The children made some lovely 'Get Well Soon' cards for Ela.

Sycamore Class

Last week in sycamore class, we learnt about transport. As a class we enjoyed learning about the importance of road safety and how to cross a road. We all participated in an educational activity which entailed lots of role play. Our teacher simulated different road markings in the class where we learnt how to stop, look and listen. We were privileged to have a zebra crossing that we all took turns to cross following various signals from our teacher.

Our fun filled week continued with learning all about pancake day. We learnt that the biggest pancake in the world measured 15metres. To end our discussion, we were all treated to pancakes with lemon, orange and bananas.

To mark St David's day, we discussed key details

about the Saint and the festival finishing with a lovely arts and crafts activity making daffodils. In the Montessori classroom we revisited the geometric solids. The children matched the geometric solids to corresponding images



including the sphere, cube, cylinder and triangular prism. The learning experience ended with a three period lesson of three of the shapes which the children did magnificently well!!

A big thank you to Miss Celestina who brought some frog spawn into school for us to see. We all used the

magnifying glass to observe the spawn. Hopefully we can welcome some tadpoles soon.

This week we will be continuing our studies with British Transport. We must not forget World Book Day and some lovely activities are planned to mark this annual event.

Oak Class

Last week, we learnt about British Transport -Keeping safe on British roads. We started by focusing on how to be safe on the road by learning the actions: Stop, Look and Listen. We acted out the road safety game as we use different coloured



chalks to mark out some paths and roads on the floor. We pretended to be on the road which was fun, however we remembered that it is not safe to cross the road alone as we need to hold onto our parent's (or a grown-ups) hand. We also used toy vehicles to practice when to stop and cross the

road. We nicely took turns amongst ourselves which was great.

In addition, we celebrated Pancake Day and learnt why it is also called Shrove Tuesday. We had the

imagination activity where we pretended to make pancakes using all ingredients we could think of and at the end we toss some pancakes from the pan into the air!!! We absolutely enjoyed this. Afterwards, we sat down to have a delicious pancake snack topped with some lemon juice and bananas.



We ended our week by celebrating St David's Day. We learnt the history behind the celebration and the significance of the leek and daffodil. At the end we made our own unique daffodil whilst



exploring with various materials.

This week, we hope to learn about London new and old buses as well as the London Black cab. We will also celebrate World Book Day and we are all looking forward to dressing up in our

favourite book character on Thursday.

Nursery:

Last week the nursery children were learning about London and it's landmarks. We were looking at pictures of London landmarks, identifying them and

learning their names. The children enjoyed creating the river Thames, Big Ben and the Tower bridge paper craft as part of our display board. We read "The Queen's Hat" a picture book about London landmarks and sang action songs about London. We




enjoyed pancakes for snack, acknowledging that Pancake Day is on a Tuesday.
