
## **Black History Month**


#### Children's House Brookscroft

In our Brookscroft Children's House last week we had discussions around the history of transport. The children

were able to recognise that at first, humans' main way of transportation was by walking. Over time, we have progressed to using animals and wheels and nowadays a vast variety of different modes of transport thanks to technological advancements. In a group art-activity children had the opportunity to discuss and create carriages as part of their historical learning.



We enjoyed going to visit our friends at Penrhyn to join for our Harvest Festival. The children read and sang beautifully; thank you for all your generous donations for Mill Grove.



It is lovely to see children continue to explore with the materials in our environment. The small number rods have been used to introduce arithmetic. Children find connections between smaller rods being put together to become equal to larger rods, and what happens to the quantities when you add or take away rods.

In the Language area, a child is observed taking small wooden numbers and using their phonic knowledge to begin building words. In a Montessori classroom, children working independently with the Large Moveable Alphabet are never corrected in their spelling. The moveable alphabet provides a child with the means to express



their thoughts without the obstacle of handling a pencil and letter formation. They use their current knowledge of letters and sounds, and this becomes more accurate over time as their phonological awareness and reading experience increases.

This week, we will begin discussions around water transport. Our phonetic sound will be 'm' – please help your child to hear this sound in everyday objects and when out and about!

#### Children's House Elm

This week we celebrated the Harvest Festival. Children have given thanks for the crops which have been safely harvested though interactive stories, rhymes, songs and more.

In group sessions, we have spoken to the children

about Black History Month. This has prompted some lovely discussions around what makes us unique and observations around everybody having different skin colour, eye colour, hair colour and more. We recognised the month with an art activity.



We have also been learning about the history of transportation - how first humans had only legs to walk and transport around, later the use of animals and wheels. Children recognised that in today's world we have lots of different types of transport thanks to the development of different technologies. We made an old historic carriage to understand the significance about this history.

Our out and about session was learning about how different size vehicles pass through narrow and wide tunnels, increasing the children's spatial awareness.

We heard the sound 'n' in sound games and groups last week. Some children traced the sandpaper letter and others are able to practice the formation on a chalk board or tracing in sand.





This week is our last week before the half-term. We look forward to lots more learning!

#### Children's House Oak

This week in Children's House Oak, we have been learning about the history of different land transport vehicles. We covered cars, trains and bikes over the week and the children enjoyed looking at photos of old vehicles and seeing the progression of how modes of transport have changed over the years.

We also had our Harvest Festival assembly, the children enjoyed presenting their song "the wheels on the tractor"! We showed good listening skills by supporting the other classes in their songs and poems.

We spoke about Black History Month with the children. Naia brought in some flags of her family's heritage, which the children really enjoyed looking at and learning about.

The children took great joy in making oat and raisin cookies for Harvest week and loved exploring the different ingredients. The children have also really enjoyed transferring activities this week. These activities help with fine motor skills, concentration and handeye coordination.



This week we will be learning about water transport. The children will be learning about identifying different methods of water transport like boats, yachts and submarines. We will also be speaking about the different parts of a sail boat.

Our sound of the week this week is the letter "m". Children can practice finding things around the house that begin with the sound "m", some may be able to recognise where a word ends with the sound 'm'.

During our out and about session we will be looking at the difference between a boat and a submarine and looking at what items float and what items sink. This is a fun experiment you could recreate at home during the half-term.

## **Nursery - Acorn and Seedlings**

Another successful week for out Nursery classes. We enjoyed learning about history of transport and all children were very engaged in conversation about how they get to school. We used different shapes to create

car, bus, or train and we are becoming more confident when identifying shapes and colours.

We enjoyed celebrating autumn by having harvest festival on Tuesday. All WMS classes had fun reading books and singing harvest songs in the garden. We are also enjoying mud kitchen in the garden. Children are collecting sticks and leaves to use when outdoors and mixing them with water and soil. Our sound of the week was "n". We looked at different objects beginning with this sound and some of the children practiced their writing skills using sand paper numbers.

In the classroom we continue playing singing games with actions. These are very popular, and we hope that you are hearing some of the songs at home.

Children are enjoying using practical life and Sensorial activities where they develop independence, concentration and hand and eye coordination.

This week, we will be discussing water transport. We will be learning about different boats, yachts, ferries and hovercraft. There will be lots of art activities and a sink and



float experiment. We will continue learning to identify new shapes.

Our letter of the week is letter "m". Please feel free to find objects beginning with "m" at home as well.
